

THE STRONGEST FAITH ST. MARTIN, BISHOP OF ROME

When we come together for Liturgy

each week, we say the Creed together, don't we? We say out loud what we Orthodox Christians believe.

Today, we celebrate the nameday of somebody who said out loud what we believe...but he was hurt again and again for that. Sometimes, he was even so hungry and thirsty, but still Saint Martin wouldn't stop saying the truth.



Saint Martin (who was the bishop of Rome, Italy) lived many years ago, and he died in the year 655. At that time, the emperor wanted all the Christians to believe something about Jesus Christ that just wasn't true. In fact, it was a heresy (a heresy is a belief that goes against the truth)!

The emperor was so angry that he even sent somebody to kill this saint! But something kept the person from doing this awful thing, and he was even blinded on the way back home. Again and again, the emperor did such cruel things to Saint Martin. Finally, the emperor sent Martin to be a prisoner on a little island, and he gave him hardly any food or water. Saint Martin never gave up saying the truth about Christ. He is called a "Confessor" because he was hurt for believing in Christ. (A martyr is somebody who died for believing in Christ.) Always remember—God wants us to stick up for the truth, and Saint Martin did just that!

We celebrate St. Martin today, April 13th (OC: April 26th).
