Seventh Sunday of Luke

In today's Epistle Reading, we hear a letter from Saint Paul. He wrote many letters to the first Christians to help them remember what was truly important. In his letter to the Galatians, he wanted to make sure everyone understood one big thing: We can't earn God's love by how good we are or by doing certain things — we only experience **God's love through his sacrifice on the Cross.**

Some people were starting to think they had to "add" extra things to the Gospel to make God happy. Paul said, "No! Jesus already did everything for us." When Paul finished writing his letter, he grabbed the pen himself and wrote in BIG letters – like using bold or highlighter today! He wanted everyone to pay attention:

"Don't trust in yourselves. Trust in Jesus. And if you're going to brag about anything, brag about what Jesus did for you!"

We all like to be proud of something: maybe we got an A on a test, scored a goal, or made a great picture in art class. It's okay to be happy about those things, but Saint Paul says the best thing to be proud of is Jesus' love. We don't need to show off or prove we're good enough – we just need to love God and others the way Jesus does.

Craft - Paper Angel Ornament

Materials:

- Paper plate (regular size)
- Scissors
- Glue stick or white glue
- Pipe cleaner for halo
- Construction paper
- Markers or crayons

Instructions:

- 1. Cut the Plate Take the paper plate and cut out a deep triangular wedge (from rim toward centre) so the remaining plate forms the angel's body/robe
- 2. Form the Angel Shape Bend the plate so the two sides meet to form a cone-shape (robe). Glue or tape the overlapping edges.
- 3. **Create the Head and Halo -** Cut a circle or oval from construction paper for the angel's head; draw a face with a marker. Make a halo from the pipe cleaner or foil and attach it above the head. Glue the head onto the top of the robe.
- 4. Add Arms/Hands Cut simple hand/arm shapes from paper and glue them onto the sides of the robe so the angel appears ready to help.
- 5. **Decorate the Robe -** Use metallic gel pen or glue glitter in lines, stars, or crosses.
- 6. **Finish & Display -** Attach a string/ribbon at the top if you'll hang the angel.
